Diamante embraces another environmental initiative

TORONTO --When people gather at the Sheraton Centre to hear former British prime minister Tony Blair Thursday, May 29, they'll leave with a tree to plant.

The event, *An Evening with Tony Blair*, is a fundraising gala for Women's College Hospital. As sponsors of the show, Diamante Development Corp. and its latest condominium project, The Florian, are providing oak, sugar maple and red pine seedlings as gifts for those who attend.

"Being a female business leader, I am keenly aware of women's issues and wanted to support a Toronto event that will benefit women."

The future of the city is also of major concern to Ms. Di Lorenzo and her company, and a healthy urban fabric needs strong cultural institutions as well as innovative health facilities and a healthy business environment.

In addition to the Women's College Hospital event this month, Diamante is among a half dozen sponsors of the Royal Conservatory of Music's "Royal Occasion" gala Wednesday, May 28.
